1. Call to Order, Pledge of Allegiance and Roll Call.

Mayor Frank J. Kuntz called the regular meeting to order at 5:17 p.m. Councilmember Mike Poirier led the Pledge of Allegiance. Councilmembers Jim Bailey, Lyle Markhart, Keith Huffaker and Mike Poirier were present, with Councilmembers Mark Kulaas and Ruth Esparza absent and Councilmember Linda Herald en route.

2. Consent Items:

Motion to approve agenda, vouchers, and minutes from previous meetings.

<u>Motion to approve the consent items by Councilmember Keith Huffaker. Councilmember</u> <u>Jim Bailey seconded the motion. Motion carried (4-0).</u>

3. Citizen Comments. None.

4. Presentations.

Public Power Week Proclamation was read by Councilmember Keith Huffaker.

5. Action Items.

A. SR 285 – North Wenatchee Avenue Improvements Pre-Design; Project No. 1720

Public Works Director Matt Leonard presented the proposed projects along N. Wenatchee Ave. Mayor and Council commented. Jim Bailey further commented and asked questions.

Motion by Councilmember Mike Poirier for City Council to authorize the Mayor to negotiate with KPG for design services for the SR 285 North Wenatchee Avenue Improvements Pre-Design (Project No. 1720), and further authorize the Mayor to sign a contract on behalf of the City. Councilmember Jim Bailey seconded the motion. Motion carried (4-0).

[Councilmember Linda Herald joined the meeting at 5:30 p.m.]

B. Washington Street Irrigation Association Agreement

Public Works Director Matt Leonard presented staff report, Mayor and Council commented.

Motion by Councilmember Keith Huffaker for City Council to authorize the Mayor to sign an agreement with Washington Street Irrigation Association to provide irrigation water to Washington Park. Councilmember Lyle Markhart seconded the motion. Motion carried (5-0).

C. City Hall – Governmental Services Administration (GSA) Bid

Economic Development Director Steve King presented the staff report. Mayor and Council commented.

Motion by Councilmember Lyle Markhart to authorize the Mayor and staff to submit a bid to the Federal Government for lease of the existing City Hall building. Councilmember Linda Herald seconded the motion. Motion carried (5-0).

D. Olds Station Sanitary Sewer Extension Phase 1 – Project No. 1718

Senior Engineer – Utilities Jeremy Hoover presented the staff report. Mayor and Council commented.

Motion by Councilmember Keith Huffaker for City Council to authorize the Mayor to negotiate with RH2 Engineering, Inc., for design services for the Olds Station Sanitary Sewer Extension Phase 1 (Project No. 1718), and further authorize the Mayor to sign a contract on behalf of the City. Motion seconded by Lyle Markhart. Motion carried (5-0).

6. Public Hearings.

E. Shieni Annexation

The Mayor called the public hearing to order. Community Development Director Glen DeVries presented staff report. The Mayor asked for public comment. There was no one who wished to speak.

Motion by Councilmember Jim Bailey to approve Ordinance No. 2017-21, providing for the annexation of an unincorporated area located at the northeast corner of Stella and Walnut known as the Shieni Annexation, subject to the provisions of Ordinance No. 2007-34 and all subsequent amendments thereto. Motion seconded by Linda Herald. Motion carried (5-0)

7. Reports.

a. Mayor's Report

- (1) The Mayor reported about the Finance Committee meeting that was held earlier, all department heads submitted their budgets and requests our timing in accordance with state law. Some additional meetings will be held to discuss smaller items next week.
- (2) The City has 1.6 million dollars in payback from the Public Facilities District, 1 million will go to Streets. The rest will be allocated at a later date.
- (3) Executive Services Director Allison Williams shared the announcement of FEMA Award honorable mention for Community Preparedness regarding the Community Planning Assistance for Wildfires process. Mayor gave kudos to Allison and Steve King and Chief Burnett on this project.
- (4) Coming up: Meeting with Washington State Senator Brad Hawkins in October, and State Legislators on November 9th.
- (5) Great team working on INFRA Grant. Due date is November 2nd. Future trip of the team to Washington D.C.

- (6) The Mayor commented about the Economic Development breakfast and all the new and exciting happenings in the valley, he added that the Diamond Foundry will bring job opportunities to the valley.
- (7) Mayor commented about city's potential rating upgrade. Brad Posenjak provided additional comments.
- (8) Mayor said that community member Bob Parlette passed away last week, he said that our trail system would not be what it is today if it wouldn't have been for his leadership.

BACKGROUND - PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY BOARD

The Arts, Recreation and Parks Commission is a nine-member citizen volunteer commission that serves in an advisory capacity to the Wenatchee City Council. The primary functions of the Commission are to:

- Review and make recommendations concerning recreation program offerings of the City.
- Oversee the City's art collection and comprehensive arts program.
- Provide recommendations regarding the acquisition, development and maintenance of park areas.
- Serve as the City Forestry Board and oversee the Urban Forestry Program.

I. OVERVIEW

City staff have been working with Stemilt Growers to coordinate a public private partnership that will facilitate the extension of McKittrick Street across the BNSF railroad tracks to Miller Street. The McKittrick Street extension was identified in the North Wenatchee Master Plan as a signature street supporting the redevelopment of the area impacted by the Sleepy Hollow fires. The city is pursuing a railroad underpass at this location and thus this partnership will constitute securing right of way for the future underpass. In addition, identification of right of way will provide certainty in terms property configurations related to road right of way. Stemilt Growers has agreed to work with the city in partnership as both the city and Stemilt receives mutual benefit by establishing this right of way and constructing the extension of McKittrick Street. This effort is consistent with the adopted 2017 Comprehensive Plan.





The actual construction of the street will depend on the city's success of obtaining grants. This year, the city solicited funding from the Community Economic Revitalization Board to construct an atgrade crossing as an interim measure. However, funding did not materialize due to the lack of passage of a State capital budget. The City was notified, however, that due to other projects coming in under budget or not proceeding, CERB does have funding for the City for this project. Resolution 2017-33 provides for the City's application and match for CERB, however, due to a smaller grant award, this funding will focus on security the right of way for the project.

A preliminary budget estimate has been developed for the right of way of \$1.2 Million. This investment will include removal of approximately 80 feet of an existing building that was slightly damaged in the fires as well as securing right of way as depicted below.

WHEREAS, the City plans under the Growth Management Act and has adopted a Comprehensive Plan entitled "Planning to Blossom 2025: Wenatchee Urban Area Comprehensive Plan"; and

WHEREAS, the adopted Comprehensive Plan identifies North
Wenatchee as a critical commercial district for the City; and

WHEREAS, in the summer of 2015 a fire storm caused fires at three major industrial uses in the North Wenatchee Business District; and

WHEREAS, the city applied for and was awarded a Community Economic Revitalization Planning Grant from the Department of Commerce to develop a master plan for the 50-acre impacted area; and

WHEREAS, the master plan identified the need for a railroad crossing to open up the area for development by providing improved access across the Seattle Chicago BNSF mainline; and

WHEREAS, the city has funding to build a new McKittrick/North Wenatchee Avenue intersection and extend McKittrick Street to the west side of the BNSF tracks; and

WHEREAS, the city is working with Stemilt Growers, owners of the property located east of the BNSF railroad tracks to facilitate development of their property to support a committed business to utilize one of their remaining warehouses; and

WHEREAS, right of way and removal of approximately 80 feet of the existing warehouse is necessary to facilitate building McKittrick Street east of the BNSF railroad tracks; and

WHEREAS, Stemilt Growers supports the city purchasing this right of way and building an at grade railroad crossing as a temporary access solution while funding is pursued for an underpass; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City of Wenatchee to support improved commerce, job development, and redevelopment of the North Wenatchee district through providing critical infrastructure that supports the area as well as the city.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY the City Council of the City of Wenatchee to declare its support of the application for committed partner funding from the Community Economic Revitalization Board within the Department of Commerce in the amount \$973,185 to be used for the purchase of right of way and removal and restoration of an existing warehouse located within the proposed right of way in preparation for construction of a BNSF railroad crossing. Furthermore, the City of Wenatchee commits \$365,000 in local funding to match this grant and loan as well as the debt service to support the repayment of the loan with a principal amount not to exceed \$973,185.

I. OVERVIEW

Coleman Oil, Inc., located at 3 Chehalis Street, has been identified by the Department of Ecology as the source of petroleum groundwater contamination. Since May, Coleman Oil has been allowed (under agreement with the City) to pump the contaminated groundwater at their facility to the surface, treat said groundwater with approved mechanical/chemical strategies at their site, and discharge "clean" groundwater to the City's Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) until the groundwater contamination has been mitigated.

Thus far the agreement has worked well and Coleman Oil has been in compliance with discharge requirements established by Ecology and the City. However, Coleman's site remediation is not complete and their current 6-month agreement with the City will expire in November.

Coleman has requested another 6-month agreement to continue their site cleanup.

II. ACTION REQUESTED

Staff recommends that the City Council authorize execution of the Agreement by the Mayor at a future date, at other than a public meeting.

No impacts; all costs to implement the Agreement shall be borne by Coleman Oil.

IV. PROPOSED PROJECT SCHEDULE

Coleman Oil desires to continue discharging treated groundwater to the WWTP. The Agreement term is 6-months, if necessary; the Agreement may be extended at the discretion of the City.

Agreement for Temporary Discharge of Treated Groundwater to the City of Wenatchee Publicly Owned Treatment Works

AGREEMENT made this <u>4th</u> day of <u>November</u>, 2017, by and between the City of Wenatchee, a Washington municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "City," and Coleman Oil, Inc. hereinafter referred to as "Coleman."

Recitals

Whereas, the City owns and operates a Publicly Owned Treatment Works (hereinafter "POTW"); and

Whereas, Coleman desires to discharge treated groundwater from the spill cleanup at 3 Chehalis Street, Wenatchee, Washington, which has the potential to adversely affect the City's POTW; and

Whereas, the City and Coleman desire to enter into this special agreement pursuant to WCC 4.08.060 (4) setting forth special terms under which Coleman may discharge its treated groundwater to the POTW.

1. TERM OF CONTRACT:

- 1.1 The CONTRACT will expire upon completion of the project or six months after the effective date, whichever occurs first.
- 1.2 This CONTRACT is issued to Coleman for the specific discharge of treated groundwater from the site at 3 Chehalis Street, Wenatchee, Washington.
- 1.3 The CITY reserves the right to modify or terminate this CONTRACT at any time in the event it deems modification or termination is necessary to preserve the integrity and function of the POTW. City shall notify COLEMAN in writing of any proposed modifications or termination three (3) calendar days prior to the implementation of such modifications or termination.

2. USE OF SEWERS:

- 2.1 All use by Coleman of CITY sewers shall be in compliance with all federal, state and local regulations including Wenatchee City Code Chapter 4.08.
- 2.2 COLEMAN shall install a wastewater discharge meter on all sewer connections prior to beginning wastewater discharges. Meter specifications and location shall be approved by the CITY. The meter shall be read daily by COLEMAN and meter readings shall be submitted weekly to the CITY in a format and method acceptable to the CITY.

- 2.3 COLEMAN shall provide all testing data to the CITY and shall not discharge until written approval is received from the CITY for each batch. The CITY shall respond by the end of the next business day from when the data is received. The CITY may require additional analysis to the testing required by this CONTRACT at COLEMAN's expense. The CITY reserves the right to not accept specific batches.
- 2.4 COLEMAN shall only discharge to the POTW Monday through Friday. With advanced written approval from the CITY, discharges may be accepted on Saturday or Sunday.
- 2.5 COLEMAN shall be limited to a maximum discharge to the POTW of 4,000 gallons per day and at a maximum rate of 10 gallons per minute.
- 2.6 This CONTRACT and the authorization to discharge cannot be transferred, sold, or otherwise given to a new owner, new user, different premises, or any new or modified operation unless authorized in writing by the CITY.

3. ANALYTICAL TESTING, & FEES:

- 3.2 All testing must be performed by a Washington State certified laboratory that at the time of testing is certified for the tests shown in Table 3-1.
- 3.3 COLEMAN shall be billed a base fee of \$40.70 per month plus \$3.90 per hundred cubic feet as well as applicable utility taxes to discharge to the POTW. In addition, a 15% administrative fee shall be applied to the monthly bill before taxes.

4. INSPECTIONS & REPORTING

- 4.1 COLEMAN shall allow CITY staff to enter upon COLEMAN's premises at 3 Chehalis during operating hours upon one hour advance notice by the CITY to:
 - 4.2.1 Inspect any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and control equipment), practices, storage facilities or operations.
 - 4.2.2 Have access to and copy any records that must be kept as a condition of the CONTRACT or the WASHINGTON STATE DEPARTMENT OF ECOLOGY.
 - 4.2.3 Sample or monitor for the purpose of assuring compliance.
 - 4.2.4 Inspect any production, manufacturing, fabricating or storage area where pollutants regulated under this CONTRACT could originate, be stored, or be discharged to the sewer system.
- 4.2 COLEMAN shall report any accidental or slug discharges immediately to the CITY. In case of an accidental or slug discharge or any other substantial incident which may have an adverse impact on the POTW, COLEMAN shall contact the CITY at (509)888-3324 between 7:00 A.M. and 3:30 P.M. and after hours call the CITY's afterhours emergency line at 1-800-374-5632.
- 4.3 COLEMAN shall notify the CITY for review and approval of any proposed changes to discharges at least seven (7) calendar days prior to the modified waste stream being discharged to the POTW.

5. ENFORCEMENT

- 5.1 The CITY reserves the right to initiate enforcement action for any violation of this CONTRACT or Wenatchee City Code Chapter 4.08.
- 5.2 COLEMAN may be billed surcharges and fines for violations for violations of this CONTRACT. Payment by Coleman shall be due in the normal course along with regular monthly sewer charges.
- 5.3 Enforcement action will be in accordance with the administrative and judicial actions under Wenatchee City Code Chapter 4.08.

6. INDEMNIFICATION:

COLEMAN shall defend, indemnify and save the CITY and its elected officials, officers and employees harmless from any and all claim and risk and all losses, damages, demands, suits, judgments, and attorney fees or other expenses of any kind on account of injury to or death of any and all persons, on or account of all property damage of any kind, or loss of use resulting therefrom, to any party arising out of, or in any manner connected with, the service performed under this contract, or caused in whole or in part by reason of the negligence or unlawful acts or omissions of COLEMAN, its' subcontractors, employees or agents, except only for those losses resulting from and to the extent of the negligence of the CITY. COLEMAN waives its' immunity under the State Industrial Insurance

ACT, Title 51 RCW, solely for the purposes of this indemnification. This waiver has been mutually negotiated by the parties.

7. <u>INSURANCE</u>:

COLEMAN shall obtain and keep in force during the term of the CONTRACT insurance in no less than the following amounts:

I. OVERVIEW

This project received Safe Routes to School (SRTS) funding in March of last year and consists of acquiring right of way along the easterly side of Princeton Street across the street from Lewis and Clark Elementary for the construction of sidewalks where they currently do not exist. The project will also provide for a formal marked mid-block crosswalk in front of the main entrance to the school.

The project received right of way certification on June 2017 and received construction funding authorization from WSDOT/FHWA July 2017.

A request for bids was issued August 31, 2017. Seven bids were received on September 28, 2017. J&K Construction, LLC is the low bidder at \$767,732.16. The low bid is reasonable and within 2% of the Engineer's Estimate. WSD has reviewed and approved their portion of the work per our Interlocal Agreement with them.

II. ACTION REQUESTED

Staff recommends the city Council award the contract for the construction of the Lewis and Clark Elementary Sidewalk Improvements, Project 1521, to J&K Earthworks, in the amount of \$767,732.16 and authorize the Mayor to approve the construction contract.
